## **Chair's Platform**

#### Street-O 2024



The days are getting longer and the clocks changed to BST on Sunday – so it's nearly time to restart Street-O! This year's season will start in <u>Welwyn Village on 16 April</u>, with our secretary Elzabeth Disney as planner.

A change this year is that we will run a league over the course of the season, with the following competitions:

Open champion:	highest score (100 points for 1st place, 99 points for 2nd, etc) for your best 8 events [all eligible]
Women's champion:	highest score (100 points for 1st place, 99 points for 2nd, etc) for your best 8 events [women eligible]
Highest efficiency:	highest aggregate efficiency score (MapRun score ÷ kilometres travelled; 5 events minimum)
Clean sheet:	highest MapRun score total without ever exceeding the 45 min time

**Organisers** will receive their highest score in the rest of their season for their own event for calculating the open/women's champion classes.

For the August events, we have pencilled in a return to Park-O or hybrid courses, which will allow juniors to compete and have proved popular in the past.

I ran a **webinar** for potential Street-O planners, providing details of how to use <u>OOMap</u> to generate a Street-O map. For those who weren't able to attend, the recording will be available for a few weeks at:

## The earliest days of HH...

We have club archives going back to *almost* the first days of the club. At the time, in 1968, British Orienteering published a monthly newsletter called Stop Press. The July issue said:

It is anticipated that in the autumn, clubs will be forming in Essex, Kent, Sussex and North London. Names of persons interested in forming clubs can be obtained from the Secretary.

The Orienteer (predecessor to CompassSport magazine), September 1968, lists 4 new clubs in the South Eastern Orienteering Association (SEOA): HH, SOS, The London Bloodhounds and The Surrey Seekers, all with contact addresses.

So it looks like an inaugural HH meeting was held in late June or during July 1968, where a provisional committee was probably set up.

The first mention of any HH activity is in the December '68 Stop-Press:

The Happy Herts and London Bloodhounds are organising a Training Event at St. Albans on 16th Feb and a Novices Event on 23rd Feb. Details from B. Williams, 62 Batchwood Drive, St. Albans.

Sometime we should have a look in the BOF archives which are held at Sheffield University! Any volunteers?

Other people are remarkably close to the magic 12 points. I'll give an update about every quarter.



The first legs on Sian's course:






## JK 2024 – Sprint


#### Middle (aka a tough mudder)

Decent run, a few small mistakes getting caught in the green but nothing major which is a big positive. A bit calamitous in the mud though. Struggled to properly read the map with the amount of mud on it. Happy with my position on M20, but not so much when you include the M18s...

#1 good. #2, came down off the spur thinking it was in the re-entrant so lost a bit in the circle. #3 good. #4 (where it starts to get muddy) good nav but lost my shoe in the mud, had to dig to get it out, subconsciously used my map as a spade... #5 good nav, wearing my o shoe as a slider as was mainly focussed on cleaning my map that had turned into brown only map (literally). #6 got the shoe back on eventually, struggling to read the map still. #7 great (won the leg, get me woo). #8, the kite was literally under the mud, good lord. #9 decent. #10 bit hesitant as naving on a windows map at this part of the course because of the mud. #11 veered too far left towards open, idiot. #12 mud. #13 grotty mud. #14 hit the wall. #15 tried taking a different route to give me some dead running to try and properly clean my mud on a clean bit of my top but poor execution of leg towards the end. #16 got caught in the thick green and had to back out and go round, v annoying and poor route choice at the death. #17, 18, 19, 20, basically a yellow, too many people in the way imo.

Very muddy, scrappy in places, could definitely be cleaner but no glaring mistakes so moving in the right direction. Great fun though.


## JK 2024 – Long






## O Puzzle

#### Thanks to John Duffield

Five members of Old Codgers OC had a bad month. They each attended one event, all different types, and all made foolish errors. From the information below, who ran what type of event, what time did they start, and what foolish error did they make?



- 1) Jeff, who ran the Classic event at least picked up the right map. He started after 02:00.
- 2) Alice lost a shoe in a bog.
- 3) The Relay runner started at 03:00.
- 4) The runner who (should have) started at 01:00 left his kit on his front doorstep. This was not in the Sprint event.
- 5) One of the ladies started at 12:30.
- 6) The person who ran in the Score event forgot to take a compass; this event was not the last to start.
- 7) Lynne had the latest start.



## **GPS in Orienteering**

## We're not allowed to use GPS, are we?


The Rules are quite clear: "8.5 Competitors are permitted to only use a GPS device to record data for use in post-race analysis." So Routegadget is fine, and we use MapRun for informal events.

But rule 8.5 doesn't stop GPS being used <u>before</u> the event. Mappers have used GPS for ages, with a pinch of salt. These traces show why the pinch of salt is needed...

It's pretty certain they all followed the paths on this leg. Most of the tracks are within about 10m of the centre line but not all (the footprint of small depressions is 12mx6m). This shows you can't just map the path where your GPS track went. And these tracks were all in the same couple of hours, running straight lines, with only light tree cover.

## What about planners and controllers?


For a while I used Open Orienteering Mapper app to show my position on my phone but found it a bit fiddly. Simon uses OCAD Sketch, which appears more robust and also allows him to pencil in map changes in the field.



Since lockdown I've been using MapRun, specifically its

CheckSites application. It only takes a few minutes to set up an All Controls score course using the OCAD and PurplePen files you've already got (instructions in our <u>wiki</u> under Street-O).

So, you can see where you are and you get a beep when you're within 15m (+/- ~10m GPS error):



What does using CheckSites gain you?

- For a start, it's really helpful to know that you are at the right feature, and when you can't see the tape you aren't asking the perennial question "Is it me that's wrong or the planner or the map or has the tape just gone?"
- It frees you up to spend more time on the critical question: Can I expect an orienteer to find this control, using the skills expected for this course, using only this map and a compass, from any reasonable approach (including if they've overshot and relocated)?
- It would also show up map errors eg a feature mapped 50m away from where it actually is. Fortunately, those errors are much rarer now many maps are based on LiDAR.

Nowadays, although I have a paper map and compass with me, I spend most of the time following the CheckSites map on my phone. Take a spare battery pack!



## Working together


There's another advantage to CheckSites. Let me digress for a moment. I was always told that Planner and Controller shouldn't go into the forest together, because they will influence each other. I've done it a few times for Urban events, but then you normally know you're in the right place, the question is more whether it is an appropriate place for a control. When Mark Thompson from TVOC suggested we go out together for Ashridge it was the presence of CheckSites that let me accept. It's if you like a 3<sup>rd</sup> opinion on your position on the map. And Mark and I are swapping roles for Hodgemoor later this month, again we have visited together.

So we spent a very constructive 2.5 days in Ashridge and 1.5 in Hodgemoor, having conversations like this and resolving issues on the spot:

- Controller calls off control code and description, commenting as necessary, Planner confirms it before taping.
- In between controls you're always counting off features to each other, making sure the map represents the terrain as it is now.
- "Make this a shallow re-entrant"
- "Short Green people will struggle to climb out of that depression, make the control E part so they can stay high"
- "If you're going direct, I'll come in from the next path junction"
- "There's an unmapped patch of bramble here"
- "Would people expect this to be mapped? Are similar items mapped elsewhere?"
- "This small depression is half hidden under holly and close to the path. If it's only for Light Green and above the one a bit further away is better"
- "If you agree this rootstock should be mapped, the control is better there than on the earthwall"
- "Is this the small depression? No other rootstock hollows are mapped and CheckSites says we're 30m short"
- ...and importantly, lots of "Yes", "That's good" etc

Yes, all of the above could have been resolved remotely, although some might have taken a bit of discussion or even another visit. This way it gets resolved on the day, amicably and no issue is too trivial to raise because you can afford a minute to decide it's not worth bothering with. Naturally, if there are consequential changes to the courses, that's best done when the Planner gets home and can do it carefully.

I've left the best until last. Full disclosure: I only discovered it recently. CheckSites allows you to add a waypoint with a text label. So you can record all these decisions with a little "x" showing where it was.



#### So...

I find using CheckSites is always helpful, even on my own. And joint

site visits work if you both approach it as a means of improving the courses, rather than Controller marking homework and Planner being defensive. But the relationship between Planner and Controller (not to mention Mapper) is a whole other article or even training module, above my pay grade.
